# Celebrating 75 years of Service





In 2022 Citizens Electric Corporation celebrated its 75-year anniversary serving you, the members! That 75-year history has been marked by an ever-shifting landscape for the electric utility industry, however, our dedication to our membership has remained unchanged. As we reflect on 2022 there are several highlights that we want to share with you.

### **Supply Chain & Inflation Pressures**

The supply chain challenge that we began to encounter in 2021 only heightened in 2022. Citizens Electric experienced large increases in material costs and long lead-times for deliveries. By evaluating and substituting alternate materials, carefully re-prioritizing projects and strategically increasing specific warehouse stock items, we were able to maintain normal workflow. Because we anticipate this problem continuing throughout 2023 and beyond, this remains top-of-mind for us since it directly affects our service to you.


As many continue to endure the inflationary pressures of rising costs, Citizens Electric Corporation has also faced similar pressure from escalating power supply costs. Our financial prudence helped us absorb the bulk of the mounting power supply costs in 2022. Unfortunately, the pressure became too great and our eight-year run of holding rates stable finally ended when we implemented a purchase power cost adjustment at the end of 2022. This only represents the third time in 15 years that we have utilized this adjustment. We understand that no one likes rate increases; neither do we! Moving forward, we are working to position ourselves to help stabilize future increasing power supply costs.

### **Improvement Projects**

Even though cost pressures continue to increase, reliability remains a cornerstone of our service. 2022 saw several transmission infrastructure projects break ground while others were beginning to be planned and designed. We continue to collaborate on projects with our generation and transmission provider, Wabash Valley Power Alliance, working to bring enhancements, upgrades, and rebuilds to all areas of our service territory. The transmission system is the backbone of service reliability, and we are excited to bring these projects to our membership in the coming years.

Lastly, we want our membership to know what a wonderful group of employees we have here working for you! They are intelligent, hard-working people who are dedicated to supporting the membership. Please join us in thanking all of the employees who retired at the end of 2022. This group represented nearly 300 years of service to you! We are grateful to have worked with them and wish them the best in their retirement.

Citizens Electric Corporation is here to serve you, our members. We have a 75-year history of providing our membership with reliable service at an affordable price, and we are committed to continuing that for the next 75 years.



# THE COOPERATIVE DIFFERENCE

Citizens Electric is part of an exciting future full of potential for its members. Major changes on the horizon will dramatically reshape the electric industry, and electric cooperatives have the flexibility and adaptability to capitalize on the moment. Our Strategic Planning Goals are the result of a coordinated effort by Citizens Electric staff and its Board of Directors to identify critical focal points and make them a priority in setting goals and future planning.

A long-range plan that outlines the cooperative's vision for maintaining its strength in the quickly evolving electric industry while taking advantage of new opportunities is set every twenty-five years and evaluated every three to four years. Citizens Electric began advancing many of its key priorities in 2022, such as a new, enhanced technology launch in November, energizing Crosstown substation, adding the 49th substation to its infrastructure portfolio in December and breaking ground on a new substation, Wittenberg, in November. Many of these projects are part of the plan, directing the cooperative's steps to ensure its future for safe, reliable power, keeping the members top of mind.
